Ariel Cohen received his PhD in 1971 (Hebrew University, in remote sensing). He was appointed as senior lecturer in 1972 and since 1980 he has been Professor of Atmospheric Physics and Planetary Sciences. Prof. Cohen is the founder of Lidar and spaceborne research in Israel, and was the first chairman of the Israel national committee on global warming. He is presently a member of the executive committee of the Israel space agency. In 1993/8 he served as an elected member of the Municipal Council of Jerusalem and as a vice-mayor of Jerusalem (for the environment and ceremonies).

Liz Greene is an analytical psychologist and a member of the Association of Jungian Analysts, the International Association for Analytical Psychology, and the UK Council for Psychotherapy. She is also an astrological consultant and has pioneered the integration of Jungian psychology and contemporary astrology. Founder and director of the Centre for Psychological Astrology in London, she lectures widely and has taught on the MA in Cultural Astronomy and Astrology at Bath Spa University. She is currently studying in the PhD programme of the Department of Historical Studies at the University of Bristol, researching Kabbalistic ideas in the nineteenth century 'occult revival', and is the author of numerous books on astrological and psychological themes, including *The Astrology of Fate*, *The Astrological Neptune and the Quest for Redemption*, and *The Dark of the Soul: Psychopathology in the Horoscope*.

Jarita Holbrook is an assistant professor in the Bureau of Applied Research in Anthropology, at the University of Arizona. She hails from the West coast of the United States having lived in California for most of her life. She holds advanced degrees in astronomy, astrophysics, and physics. She is an expert on the cultural astronomy of Africans and contemporary cultures who navigate by the stars. Her next project is to help identify sites in Africa suitable for nomination to the UNESCO World Heritage Site List under the Astronomy & World Heritage initiative. She is currently working to establish a field school in cultural astronomy to train undergraduate and graduate students.

Tayra Lanuza-Navarro is a post-doctoral fellow at the Department of History and Civilization of the European University Institute, Florence, Italy. Her doctorate was in History of Science at the University of Valencia, Spain, with a PhD thesis titled "Astrology, science and society in Habsburgs' Spain". She enjoyed a fellowship for research from the Smithsonian Institution for some months at the Dibner Library for the History of Science, Washington D.C., USA. Her current interest is in the attitude of the Spanish Inquisition towards astrology during the seventeenth century, and on the comparison of the situation of astrology in several European countries (Spain, England, Italy) during the seventeenth century. She is finishing her second MA, Cultural astronomy and astrology, at Bath Spa University.

Marinus van der Sluijs obtained his MA in Comparative and Historical Indo-European Linguistics from the University of Leiden, Netherlands, in 1999, adding various languages of the ancient Near East to his curriculum. As a private researcher based in the United Kingdom and Canada, he has since published articles on ancient cosmology and archaeoastronomy in the wider sense in various journals.
